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INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT ON THE ACCOUNTS

Report to the Trustees and Members of Fleet Pond Society on the accounts for the year ended 31 January 2025

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

OBJECTS OF THE CHARITY

The main charitable objects of the charity are to stimulate public interest and appreciation for Fleet Pond and its surroundings, to promote the preservation and maintenance of Fleet Pond and promote its use as a public amenity and as a Site of Special Scientific Interest and local nature reserve and to encourage the harmonious and sensitive use of Fleet Pond and its surroundings by all users, commensurate with its status as a Site of Special Scientific Interest and local nature reserve.

MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN DURING THE YEAR FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT IN RELATION TO THESE OBJECTS

The Society has continued the voluntary management activity at Fleet Pond, including habitat management and repair and upgrade of paths and protective fencing. The Island Management team also continued to tackle the scrub growth on the new islands that were created by the dredging a few years back. Care has been taken that maintenance of islands, reedbeds, marshland and heathland does not impede access or obstruct visitors' views. In fact the work has continued to open up new vistas across the open areas to the Pond, attracting positive responses from the public. We did a massive amount of work to remove many 1000s saplings and trees from several of our reedbeds. Our study of the moth populations on the reserve has been completed.

We spent a significant amount of funds on purchasing materials as well as new types of tools and replacements to allow us to be more efficient in our conservation work. We paid for four of our volunteers to have formal training on equipment we use to treat cut saplings with herbicide in our conservation work. We purchased new branded sets of pencils and keyrings to hand out at events we attended. We spent a significant sum on the publishing and distribution of our quarterly newsletter. Our handling of cash continued to be more difficult following our bank branch in Fleet closing.

The number of volunteers who help at our Friday morning conservation sessions has continued to increase significantly and they have delivered an increase in hours worked by 25% in each of the last three years. We estimate the hours they now contribute are valued at over £50,000 per annum. Sunday monthly tasks and corporate volunteer groups from local businesses continue to be very limited under the management of Hart Countryside Services (HCS). So there were minimal opportunities for young people to do community work for the Duke of Edinburgh's award or for Venture Scouts to earn conservation badges. However our work with young people has increased greatly again with the many educational and work parties our volunteers organised and ran for Beavers and Cubs from the Scouting Organisation.

We delivered numerous illustrated talks for groups from neighbouring parishes and community groups. The Society has carried out numerous outreach activities and continued to encourage public awareness by various articles in the local press and on social media and has gained a significant number of new members.

We received a good number of donations this year from our public supporters as well as Nisa's "Making a Difference Locally" fund from which we received nearly £1800. The amount of these donations we received totalled roughly £2500.
